

Beeline Lesson Plan

Beeline is one of many ways that the Mayor of Greater Manchester wants young people to see a pathway to their future, especially through the less-well understood technical education route. His ambition is called the Greater Manchester Baccalaureate, or MBacc, and Beeline is one of its tools.

About this lesson

Lesson objectives:

- 1. To understand how jobs are organised in the Greater Manchester economy to help navigate to where your career interests are.
- 2. To introduce the new Beeline tool as a way of exploring different jobs.
- 3. To explore various career pathways and learn about what qualifications and training are recommended for different jobs.

Duration: 50 minutes (flexible)

Year groups: 7 – 11 (tailor accordingly)

Gatbsy Benchmark alignment: 2, 3 (learning from career and labour market information and addressing the needs of each young person).

Resources needed

- Teacher computer and projector
- Student's notebooks and pens
- An optional, printable worksheet is available
- The corresponding presentation
- The lesson would work best with student access to computers or tablets (with internet).

Activity	Learning sequence
Starter	Slide 1 – Title slide
(10 mins)	Slide 2 – Class discussion about jobs Example activity:



	 Ask students to brainstorm jobs and write them on the board. Ask which of the jobs they've listed are what organisations in Greater Manchester need. This introduces the concept of 'demand'. Plumbers, cyber security specialists, nurses, project managers, construction workers, and many more! You can continue the conversation by asking: Where would you look for a job? When do you get a job? Does anyone want to look for a job when they're 18?

	 A two-year course at college that mixes classroom work with a 45 day workplacement. Do you know what an apprenticeship is? A job with training built in. There are different levels depending on your previous training or qualifications. There are even apprenticeships that are equivalent to a university degree. The next steps are to get a job or continue with training. Choose one of the jobs you could get at that point (e.g. youth support worker). This will take you to the Adzuna website, where you can see the number of jobs available right now in Greater Manchester and the average salary.
Exploration task	Slide 7 – setting the task

(20 111113)	Option 1: with computers/tablets
	Students can find Beeline by going to gmacs.co.uk and clicking the 'Beeline' button in the top right corner
	Option 2: without computers/tablets
	Give each student (or a group of students) one or more of the printed gateway maps. Some of the session task will need to be amended if there is no access to computers.
	You can tailor the task to suit your students or subject, e.g. Ask them to look at a gateway most relevant to your subject Allow them to choose more than one gateway. Allow them to work in groups or individually
	At the end of the activity, you might want to have the students share their findings with the class.
Plenary (10 mins)	Slide 8 - Reflection
	 What did you learn about different jobs? If the students had online access, you can ask them about how many jobs there were and what the salaries are like. Did you learn about a job you didn't know existed before? Which gateway interests you the most? Why? Q&A Open the floor for any questions about the Beeline tool or career pathways.
